A Scythian-Macedonian conflict and a siege of the city led by Zopyrion on behalf of Alexander the Great, failed with Zopyrion's death in 331 BC thanks to alliance between the indigenous Scythian nomads and the Greek inhabitants of Olbia.

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The proximity of the Greek city-states on the Black Sea coast (Pontic Olbia, Cimmerian Bosphorus, Chersonesos, Sindica, Tanais) was a powerful incentive for slavery in the Scythian society, but only in one direction: the sale of slaves to Greeks, instead of use in their economy.
